



Welcome to the 6th Jeju Forum for Peace and Prosperity

The Jeju Special Self-Governing Provincial Office, jointly with the International Peace Foundation and the East Asia Foundation, is hosting the 6th Jeju Forum for Peace and Prosperity for three days from May 27, 2011.

The Jeju Forum for Peace and Prosperity is the new name of the Jeju Peace Forum, which was launched in 2001 to help seek ways to achieve peace and prosperity in Northeast Asia, including the Korean Peninsula. The forum has held five biennial sessions since then. However, the sessions will be held on an annual basis from this year.

The Jeju Forum has continued to develop in terms of the number of participants and the range of the subjects discussed. The forum has held five biennial sessions over the past decade. Having started out with the focus on such issues as peace on the Korean Peninsula and the establishment of a regional community, the forum has expanded the scope of its interest to include issues that concern the whole of East Asia and the rest of the world. The discussion agenda has also broadened its focus from regional peace to economy, environment and culture. I sincerely expect that this forum held in Jeju, an island of world peace, will go a long way in promoting the cause of peace and prosperity in the region and worldwide.

Jeju has accomplished the following three feats: Designation as a World Geological Park; designation as a Biosphere Preservation District, and the volcanic island and its lava tubes listed as a World Natural Heritage by UNESCO. In addition, Jeju is currently being considered as one of the candidate sites for the Official New 7 Wonders of Nature.

I am very happy to see you here in the beautiful island of Jeju, and all the islanders are joining me in welcoming you from the very bottom of their hearts.

Finally, I would like to ask you to participate in our efforts to develop the forum into a world-renowned one through dialogue and collaboration. Thank you!

Overview

The theme of Jeju Forum 2011 is "New Asia for Peace and Prosperity"

In the process of overcoming the recent world economic crisis, the potential economic growth power of Asia has been spot-lighted. It is now difficult to talk about the economy of the world without Asian perspectives. More than half of the world population live in Asia. More than half of the global foreign reserves are concentrated in Asia. Five Asian countries, Korea, China, Japan, India and Indonesia, are participating in newly established G20 process and the Asian influence is steadily growing. The East Asian region is particularly dynamic area whose economic growth is leading the recovery of the global economy.

The sense of community is evolving in the East Asian region. Various discussions are taking place on the subject of regional cooperation in East Asia in many aspects and forums. The tripartite summit meetings among Korea, China and Japan are institutionalized. Besides the tripartite summit meeting of last year, various international conferences and forums are taking place to discuss the regional cooperation in this place of Jeju as well. Through these processes, the sense of community is growing, opening the new way leading to the reconciliation and cooperation by overcoming the differences and conflicts in the region.

The 6th Jeju Forum will evaluate the challenges and opportunities the rise of China and the reunification of the Korean peninsula will offer. The Forum will also take note of the great potential of new growth on the basis of the Asian entrepreneurship. With this background, various programs on Korea-China economic cooperation are prepared. The contents of new standard and its perspectives will be reviewed. New growth potential, creative industry, new leadership, the future of education and the role of women will be also addressed.

Peace and common prosperity on the Korean peninsula and East Asia through the promotion of mutual understanding will be discussed. The cultural exchanges and fusion in East Asia will be reviewed and we will evaluate how it is promoting the sense of community among the Asian peoples. Various issues of peace in East Asia such as the resolution of the North Korean nuclear problem, historical reconciliation and maritime security are among the topics. The recent natural disaster of Japan will be reviewed and among the related topics are how to deal with the climate change and natural disasters.

Jeju is the conservation zone recognized by the world for its beautiful natural heritage. Jeju Forum will address the issues of environmental conservation and the design of the cities, International cooperation for the peaceful utilization and development of the border area will be among the topics such as biological conservation of the DMZ and the development of the Tumen river. International cooperation for the development assistance to the less developed countries and eradication of diseases will be also reviewed.



The 6" Jeju Forum is hoped to serve a new momentum to persue the vision of peace and prosperity on the basis of the dynamism of East Asia.




Program at a Glance



- In the Jeiu Forum 2011, the Korea DMZ Council convenes a forum for debate on the theme of "International Cooperation for Peaceful and Ecological Conservation and Utilization of the DMZ". The DMZ is an area where mutual interests of the North and South Korea are inevitably intertwined politically, militarily, economically, environmentally, culturally and in all other realms of interests, Therefore, establishing exchanges and cooperation in the DMZ embodies a significant meaning that could trigger ripple effect for exchanges and cooperation as well as reunification to ensue over the whole peninsula. Through this forum, the Korea DMZ council hopes to reassess the intrinsic value of the DMZ which is recognized exclusively as a symbol of division and separation and furthermore to discuss on employing the DMZ in building peace settlements on the Korean peninsula and promoting mutual prosperity in Northeast Asia. Moreover, much discussion on constructing framework and measures for international cooperation and network in various fields is anticipated, particularly in the areas of security, ecology, civil society, and more

Case of Korea-Azerbaijan Official Aid

As part of KOICA's knowledge aid project, the Institute for Industrial Policy Studies (IPS) shares its experience of and strategies for attracting foreign direct investment into Korea. It helps to develop policies and models for FDI from Azerbaijan, to support the relevant institutions by training specialists, and to create a cooperative model for both countries.

Current status of and prospects for Korean Foreign Aid

After the WW II and the Korean War, South Korea, as one of the poorest countries of the world, was a recipient of ODA. In 2010, it joined the DAC of the OECD and became a donor country. South Korea is the only recipient country which became a donor country after World War II. South Korea is now at the point where it needs to enhance its international status as a Middle Soft Power pursuing internationally universal values, i.e. poverty reduction and sustainable growth for the world's poorest countries, and to create a Korean model of development cooperation which serves South Korea's national interests in a balanced manner. This session will explore the great transformation in South Korea's ODA policy and offer practical measures from a broad perspective.

UN Global Compact and Contribution to MDGs through 5W Projects

Recognizing the seriousness of poverty and climate change, issues which pose a great threat to mankind worldwide, the Seoul Research Centre for the Global Compact and the Global Compact Network Korea have proposed 5W as a new approach to solving problems through the realization of the MDG plan and to preventing the worsening of such problems as poverty and climate change. The concept of 5W, that is, World, Weather, Water, Wisdom, and Welfare, was established to emphasize the close connections between them, and suggests that human beings should overcome worldwide crises such as climate change and water shortages with their accumulated wisdom in a drive to achieve sustainable welfare in the long term, 5W is a part of the efforts to take a second look at humanity's cultural heritage, which has been neglected in the process of solving the global crisis thus far, and using it in combination with the strenuous efforts of international organizations, governments, businesses, NGOs, and civic groups and their resources to multiply our problem-solving capability. As it is a new approach to development, we will study ways of preserving the wisdom of diverse minorities, which is fading away in the face of globalization. For this session, the Seoul Research Centre for the Global Compact and the Global Compact Network Korea will form a research committee together with Korean scholars. The research committee will give presentations on the 5W project, which explores new approaches to development in order to realize MDGs,

The Korean Wave (*Hallyu*) and Cultural Fusion in East Asia: Toward an East Asian Cultural Community

The Korean Wave, or Hallvu, has left a cultural imprint throughout Asia since the dawn of the 21st century. While many considered it to be merely a passing fad, the Korean Wave still continues to enjoy wide popularity in Asia. How can we explain this Hallyu phenomenon? What enabled the Korean Wave to become so popular in the region? Its success is due in large part to the appeal of its unique content. Even more important, however, seems to be the elements of the Korean Wave that are shared by many peoples of Asia, which thus creates a deep resonance. What are these elements? If we can clearly identify those factors that appeal to the sentiments of Asian people, not only in regard to the Korean Wave but in other cultural areas as well, would it not be possible for us to shape an Asian Cultural Community by fusing those common elements found across different cultures? This session is intended to serve as a venue for specialists and practitioners to assess not simply the success factors of the Korean Wave, but also its role and implications for creating an East Asian Cultural Community, based on shared values, and in which Asian people can acquire a better understanding of each other through inter-cultural dialogue and exchange.



Jeju Stone Park

(Jeju Folklore & Women Diver Performances)

Jeju Stone Park is an ecological and cultural park that displays the history of stone culture pivotal to the history and culture of Jeju Island. Following the exhibition pathway, visitors will find stone sculptures such as Grandmother Seolmundae and Five Hundred Generals and traditional local thatched-roof houses amidst the forest. Olle Route 1

This was the first olle path to be completed and it takes walkers along the coast and past a number of oreums, which are volcanic cones that look like small mountains or hills and are found throughout Jeju Island. In fact, in Jeju Island, everything that appears to be a mountain or a hill is an oreum (with the exception of the majestic Halla Mountain) and there are 360 oreums on Jeju Island. This walk begins at a small local school (Siheung Elementary School) and leads to the Malmi and Al oreums and offers a panoramic view of some of Jeju's famous sightseeing spots, such as the Seongsan Ilchulbong Peak and Udo Island. The route then leads to the Jongdal-ri Salt Fields and to the Siheung-ri beachside road, where the sight of Sungsan Ilchulbong Peak appears once again. The conclusion of the route is the deep blue ocean at Gwangchigi Beach, which is simply spectacular.




Seongsan lichulbong Peak (Korean Folk band, "Pungmul" Performance)

Seongsan Ilchulbong Peak is designated as World Natural Heritage in 2007 as Jeju Volcanic Island and Lava Tubes by UNESCO. It rose from under the sea in a volcanic eruption over 100,000 years ago. Located on the eastern end of Jeju Island, there is a huge crater at the top of Seongsan Ilchulbong Peak. The crater is about 600m in diameter and 90m high. With the 99 sharp rocks surrounding the crater, it looks like a gigantic crown. While the southeast and north sides are cliffs, the northwest side is a verdant grassy hill that is connected to the Seongsan Village. The ridge provides an ideal spot for walks and for horse riding as well. The sunrise from the crater is magnificent. Also the Seongsan Ilchulbong Peak surrounded by bright yellow colored rapeseed flowers in the spring is truly a sight to behold.
